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#### **EDITORIAL**

## **CONSCIOUSNESS**

## **PEACE WALK**

John Mpaliza was born in Bukavu, in the Democratic Republic of Congo. He is a software engineer. He is forty five years of age and has been in Italy for the past twenty one years.

Until May 2014, he worked as a programmer in the municipality of Reggio Emilia, in the north of Italy. He decided to leave his work for a much more important reason than personal fulfilment and earning a salary. He set out to walk for peace, especially in the DR Congo, but also in the world. He became the 'Peace Walking Man'.

John is an energetic activist with very ambitious aims. He knows that "walking for peace" will bring physical, psychological and moral suffering, not to mention the heat, cold, rain and snow. It is very important for him to keep on walking even if he has no money or is tired because he has to reach his



destination. As he goes along he meets people who like to hear his message of peace. He travels 35/45 km each day.

# Why does he do it?

John wants to conscientise people about peace. He says, "I began to conscientise people about the traumatic situation of the Congolese people. Their country is very rich but they are dying of poverty". Congo-Kinshasa is a country rich in fresh water, fertile land and biodiversity. It is so rich in gold, cobalt, anything about it. I did not want to be part of this death-dealing silence. Other African countries also have the same problems caused by the tyranny and multinationals exploitation of industrialised countries. often in collusion with local leaders whom they have chosen and imposed on the people. I think that walking speaking about the daily problems of these countries as well as of my own country helps people to see how unjustly they are treated and gives hope that Congo, and Africa in general, will experience a new dawn tomorrow".

John walks quietly and joyfully. He says, "I like to think that my way of bringing the message of peace to the people I meet on my journey shows them that, in spite of all the corruption, wars, famine and injustice which we experience every day, the world is not doomed. I am convinced that the search for peace will lead to a socially just world".

It is four years since John began to walk for peace in the DR Congo and in the whole world. He keeps going by thinking of the thousands of people who are suffering in his own country and diamonds, tin, etc. that it could almost be called scandalous.

The lack of media interest in the DR Congo drove John to set out walking in order to conscientise the media. investors and politicians too. After visiting the country in 2009, John exclaimed, "I was devastated by what I saw and heard and I decided I could no longer be silent. I lost several relatives during the wars. Eight million Congolese died, about four million women suffered violence and nobody was doina throughout the world. His walking is the result of his own personal suffering, the suffering of a people and the lack of democracy.



Over the course of a month in 2016, John walked from Italy, (Reggio Emilia, where he lives) to Belgium (Brussels) to denounce the EU for the massacre in Beni (East Congo) especially and the alarming situation in the whole of the DR Congo in general.

From 1 to 29 October this year, John Mpaliza walked from Reggio Emilia (in the north of Italy) to Rome to let the world know that the situation in the DR Congo is getting worse. During the last week of this walk (23 – 29 October), he organised a lot of things to give information about Congo – conferences, sharing of experiences etc. – while still

continuing to walk. These activities were always open to all people of goodwill.

I took part in two of the events: First of all, the walk on Friday, 27 October when we walked from Piazza del Popolo to the entrance of St. Peter's Square. For security reasons and the safety of the group, we were accompanied by the Italian Police. As we walked, we sang national songs in several of the languages of our country to express our sympathy for the people. I was reminded of Psalm 136, "By the rivers of Babylon we sat down and wept when we remembered Sion". We were accompanied by a guitar as we walked and sang.

On Sunday, the last day of the programme, I went with the group to St. Peter's Square for the Angelus. John wanted us to tell the world and the



Church about the urgency of finding a rapid solution to the Congolese crisis by means of flags of the DR Congo and armbands on which were written "Peace – Pace".

Dear sisters and brothers, please pray for the alarming situation in the DR Congo. On 23 of this month at 17.30, in St. Peter's Basilica, the Pope will pray for South Sudan and the DR Congo.

# Accompanying residents of EYRE POWELL HOTEL

Direct Provision Centre in Newbridge - Britain & Ireland:



In October 2016, a group from Newbridge Parish Community, led by *Holy Family* Sister Eileen Murphy, began linking with Asylum seekers who live in the Eyre Powell Hotel, a Direct Provision Centre, in Newbridge. Over 70 people, including about 10 children, are accommodated there. They come from

15 countries on 4 continents, and widely different worlds, bringing with them their own;

History, Language, cultures and customs.

They come from a variety of educational backgrounds and life experiences. Among them, there are:

- Painters
- Nurses
- Photographers
- Bakers
- Electricians
- Teachers
- Students

One can only imagine the rich contribution they could make to Irish society. Adults in DP receive a weekly cash allowance of €21.60. They are not allowed to work - as already stated - or go to higher education. They are provided with three meals a day but are not allowed to cook their own meals, though changes in this regard are being introduced in some centres.

They share a room and keep all their belongings in one cupboard. They don't know whether they will be there months or years. It began in October 2016 when residents were invited to a coffee morning in the Parish Centre. Since then, on the first Friday of every month a group of parishioners and asylum seekers meet for coffee and a chat in the Parish Centre.

### A Wave of Green for Sri Lanka



The Holy Family College of Malaga held a variety of educational, conscientisation and fund-raising activities during the second week of May for the Bicentennial Humanitarian Project in Sri Lanka.

The participation of the pupils and their families as well as the involvement of the teachers was wonderful. Love for a *Holy Family* Project was obvious even though the college passed into the hands of the Educational Foundation of St. Dominic this year.

The teachers and pupils developed their interest in the Project by getting to know the situation of the country over the past few years by means of a letter from the Provincial of Jaffna. They also read the testimonies of some of the young people involved in the project, "Young people for a

changing world". Many were shocked by the harsh reality of everyday life in that country.

All the pupils of the three school levels were involved in decorating the college. Each one cut out the silhouette of a shirt on paper and wrote a message on it. These were hung up all over the college as a constant reminder that we were united with Sri Lanka working for the improvement of their living conditions.

That same week, Fr. José Luis Cacho, a Passionist Missionary who has spent many years on the missions, came to speak to us. He helped us to realise the harsh reality of millions of people's lives and to be aware of the value of the things which we have in our own lives.

Financially speaking, the great success of our campaign was the sale of almost 600 T-shirts for Sri Lanka. Our pupils wore these with pride in the streets around the college. Since they were brightly coloured and bore the Bicentennial logo, the people called them "The wave of green for Sri Lanka".

Different activities were organised on different days. The second-level pupils held a sports day and showed a film. Another day, they sold French-style pancakes. All the money from these activities went to the Humanitarian Project.

Tombola was organised with the children from the infant and primary levels. They enjoyed this very much and collected quite a sum of money for the project.

We know that our basic task as a college is to educate and conscientise the new generations in values such as justice, solidarity and equality. But, as well as that, on a financial level, we wanted to bring our little grain of sand to the Project of the Family of Pierre Bienvenu. We collected almost €4.000 from the various activities as a result of the efforts and work of many people. This gives even more meaning to our work of education and evangelisation.

# WE WANT A CLEAN TOWN, SO WE WENT INTO ACTION



The group Eco Namasté Quitilipi laid out a plan of action to introduce the topic of managing waste and caring for the environment so that we could have a clean town.

"We want to have a clean town", was one of the things that was said at a meeting organised by members of the ecological group Eco Namasté Quitilipi. The group is trying to conscientise the community about the management of urban waste and the care of the environment.

After the workshop which took place in the San Martín cultural centre some days later and which was attended by the environmental manager responsible for the solid waste plant of Machagai Rolando Sena, Eco Namasté decided to begin a door-to-door campaign and speak to the residents.

Some students who were interested in the topic did a programme on the radio of San José Obrero. Then the people were told how to identify different types of waste and to separate them so as to

develop habits of hygiene and cleanliness. They also received information leaflets.

When the publicity had been done in this region, they tried to put it into practice and asked the municipality to bring the waste to the plant in Machagai until the plant in Quitilipi could be repaired. And so the campaign spread to other areas.

We need the authorities to take this on as a real commitment.

While that was going on, the ecological group petitioned the municipality to get the solid waste plant put back into working order and to set up publicity campaigns.

It was clear that, for this type of action, we needed to network and that the authorities must take on their responsibility and make dealing with the problem of rubbish a priority.

During the meeting it was clear that there is more to ecology and care for the environment than just planting trees. Also, in these matters, we need the commitment of residents, teachers and, especially, the authorities.

ECO NAMASTE began a conscientisation campaign in the neighbourhood of San José Obrero.

Members of the ecological group began the operation "For a clean Town" in San José Obrero. Five groups of young people along with members of ECO Namasté Quitilipi



began going from house to house with the prior consent of the residents.

They launched this programme on the radio, saying where they would be visiting, During their visits, they would try to convince the residents to be hygienic in their homes, to separate domestic waste and to care for the environment for the good of the whole population.

During the visits, some young people from the Holy Family Hostel, along with the ecologists, explained to the residents that they were encouraging people to separate their domestic waste. They gave a brief explanation about how long it takes for some items to degrade. They distributed information leaflets and encouraged people to keep the gutters clean by not throwing plastic bottles and such things into them. Gradually, this would make an impact on the neighbourhood project. The first time round, the people were reasonably agreeable to the idea of separating domestic waste. Several times, the group was asked, "What will we do with the waste?" "Where will we bring it?" -Questions to which there are no answers.

We are going to petition the authorities about what to do with separated domestic rubbish. The leaders of each group stated their intention of insisting on the imperative need, to open the plant for treating urban solid waste. We know how important this is from what the residents said.

In other cases, we noted that some residents were unaware that there was a problem with rubbish. The opposite occurred in other homes where the residents were very aware. They congratulated the group on their initiative and were ready to join the petition to open the plant as soon as possible to alleviate the problem of waste.

size producers, fishermen, shepherds and migrants from all over the world.

This Organisation is made up of 164 organisations in 73 countries in Africa, Asia, Europe and America. Its aim is to defend small-scale sustainable agriculture so as to promote social and economic justice, to cool the planet and to defend a dignified life for rural peoples. It challenges agribusinesses, multinationals and economic policies which are destroying peoples and nature.

This event was attended by more than 500 representatives of peasants from all over the world. The slogan of the Conference was: "We Feed our People and Build the

Movement to Change the World"

The priorities of la Vía Campesina are:

- Defending the earth, forests, water, seeds
- Fighting against the monopolisation of land, the repression of peasants and violence against them
- Highlighting the role of women and generational change.

"It's struggles for the land and for agrarian reform are the most important in the whole world. If the States do not make policies that

place nature at the service of peoples and prevent the big multinationals from taking over land to set up food businesses, we will not be able to achieve Food Sovereignty. The struggle for comprehensive agrarian reform is one of the most important struggles taking place today in the different continents and it will therefore have a central place in our 7<sup>th</sup> Conference".

This year, we also took part in events organised by groups such as "anti-nuclear Salamanca" and "Stop the uranium mine", to work against a multinational mining project which is being encouraged by the government.

# A TOWN REJECTS URANIUM

The residents of Retortillo y Villvieja del Yeltes in Salamanca oppose the controversial project to build the only open-air uranium mine in Europe.



Open-air mining affects us all and affects future generations as well. It damages the environment since it contaminates rivers, destroys vegetation reduces fauna and causes respiratory and genetic illnesses. They have already cut down 4,000 oak trees and they are going to destroy 20,000 more. It is sheer ecocide. Who would want to eat anything grown in that area?

Just over two years ago, a consumers' co-operative, called EnergÉtica, was established in Castille and Leon to work towards a new energy model. They want *to use clean energy from a renewable source and to do this as a cooperative.* The same type of thing exists in other places under different names. The aim is to have regional not-for-profit co-operatives which will work closely together and not compete with one another. We have seen alarming reports from biologists, physicists and ecologists. They tell us about the deterioration of Mother Earth. Since we had the possibility of making a change, we decided to take the step and we have discovered how easy it is. The family who rents us the house have no problem with it. In fact, they want to do the same thing in their own house in Salamanca.

Now we are part of EnergÉtica. This project is attracting more families as members every day. Detailed information about it can be found on the Internet at: energeticacoop.es. We are not asking for this to be less expensive (the cost is more or less the same) but to use energy which does not damage the Planet so that we can contribute our grain of sand to promote life. Will you join us?

# DIALOGUE, A PATH TO COMMUNION



Mr. Z and his wife, K. had six children. But they never came together as a family to talk about their life. Each one lived independently. Then, one day, the wife decided, on her own accord, to send one of their daughters to her brother. That was when war broke out in the family. It was as if this event

stirred up the stagnant water that was in the heart of the head of the family and exposed all that was ruminating in his mind. Remember, we are in a patriarchal system here.

Without knowing anything about all this, one day in a simple conversation with the husband, I asked how his wife and children were. He was furious and said that he would prefer having another wife than live with her and her children. Some days later, Mr. shared with me about his relationship to his wife and children. He shared the incident of his wife sending their daughter to her brother without consulting him and how it was making a mockery of him, hurting and deeply humiliating him.

Later, having prayed over this I spoke to his wife as well, who shared her family joys and sorrows with me in the presence of her husband. I also listened to the children.

Together with Sr. Ongwisa who accompanied me, we realized that LACK OF DIALOGUE was the root cause of all.

- Mr. Z. provided food for the family took care of the schooling of the four youngest children but did not share anything with his wife. The children, especially the two eldest daughters worked in the fields to provide for some of their needs. He had not given his eldest son any share of his land. For one year the couple was not in good terms.
- Mrs K. accused him of his infidelity.
   She made decisions without consulting him.
- The children, while recognising the good done by parents, reproached them for never having a family

conversation. They were more attached to their mother than the father.

Listening became vital in the process of reconciliation. We admired how each one listened respectfully, recognising the truth and accepting the mistakes made. Their sharing was very moving. I cried when I realised how "dead" their life had been.



Each one wanted to begin anew so that experience peace and joy in the home. Empathetic listening helped me to respect each one at where (s) he was. I was fully confident that light would dawn. We searched together and discovered that the lack of dialogue was the cause of it all. We discussed together of ways to move forward, each member taking responsibility for one's share in it. As a result the father expressed his desire to be baptized and married in church. Some days later, they celebrated experience of this reconciliation having a meal with our community. We prayed together and in the process shared with them of who we are as Holy Family – with the mission of communion, called to reveal the family face of the Church. It was also an opportunity to introduce *Holy Family* Lay Associates.

The eldest daughter spoke and said, "it is the first time since I was born that we have come together to share our life. I thank the Lord and the Sisters who took the initiative to bring us together and to offer us this opportunity to be reconciled.

Little Jeremie is gradually emerging from the tunnel after a long, difficult illness. ## A NORTH-SOUTH JOURNEY ACROSS THE ISLAND

Forty-nine members of the Association of the Holy Family founded by Pierre-Bienvenu Noailles (PBN) made a north-south journey across the island-nation to strengthen peace and foster reconciliation in the country.

Participants from the north left Jaffna and travelled towards Colombo. They stopped at about 50 km from the capital, where they spent three days at the

convent of Wennappuwa, staying in the homes of other members of the same Catholic community.

Despite the brevity of the visit and "the difficulty of understanding a different language," they all attest to "deep affections and friendships".

The event took place from 8-10 June. The pilgrims - 30 young women and

girls, 12 lay women and seven sisters – came from the districts of Jaffna, Mannar and Vavuniya. For them, the meeting provided an opportunity to "share the strong love we have for each other".

For this reason, "we would like more exchange programmes," Thushari, from Colombo, told *Asia News*. "This way, we can build good, reciprocal relationships."

"A few months ago, a request came for the meeting and we welcomed it," said Sister Priyanka Perera, national leader of the Holy Family Lay group (Supasa).

"We hope to continue this for the future too."

For Sister Judith and Sister Christine. the exchange can be defined as "the good start of a long journey in which we can deepen the relationship between provinces the Colombo and Jaffna". All the travellers were "amazed at the warm reception they received. They even decorated various places."

An elderly mother received a plant as a reminder of the trip to the south. "I will plant it with love," she said, "like a tree of the Holy Family. I hope this plant will become a big tree and similarly our family too will grow."

The pilgrims not only received gifts, but also reciprocated this hospitality. For

example, Margaret Fernando who hosted Quincy and Shalika - two youth from Jaffna - for a night said, "they did not allow me to prepare breakfast. They wanted to cook pittu for me - prepared with corn flour and coconut, and an omelette with curry. For me it was like receiving the affection of two daughters."

On 8 June, the travellers were welcomed with the Aubowan, a wish of long life, followed by singing and dancing in the Sinhalese and Tamil traditions.



The next day they attended Mass, celebrated by Fr Tanter, a priest Associate. At the end of the service, they visited Santh Samaya, a home for the elderly sisters and children, and Meth Niwesa, another home for older women.
