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
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EDITORIAL

LETTING GO IS WHAT IS IMPORTANT

We are in the year 2022 , the post-capitular period, so this is the favourable time for a "new beginning" of our consecrated life, and every new beginning has a special grace given by the Spirit of God.

Such a new beginning, however, requires a change of mindset, a sincere conversion to the life of God in us, allowing ourselves to be carried by God, trusting Him and also those who represent Him.

Of course – because history moves on and we must leave behind what ties us down as persons, to welcome the new that today brings.

Our recent history has been

It was a enriched an multi-cultural living experience with different nationalities. It was a time of personal growth, transformation and experience of integration as well as interior exploration, in order to experience the human giftedness of each

person as unique. Pope Francis says in his letter (Evangelii gaudium-45) ***“A missionary heart is aware of these limits and makes itself ‘week with week....everything for everyone”***(1Cor9;22).

TAKING ACTION IN THE FIGHT AGAINST SKIN CANCER

We, the community of the Holy Family Novitiate in Idiofa, have undertaken the manual production of toilet soap made from the plants of Hyssop and Aloe Vera. This initiative is the fruit of our listening and closeness to our people, a response that we want to give to their cries and concerns. The idea was born out of the observation and reality that many people have destroyed the melanin substances in their skin and are prone to skin cancer as a result of using skin-lightening cosmetics. We are not indifferent to this situation. That is why we want to make our contribution to abolish this scourge: to guarantee the protection of the skin of the population of Idiofa in particular, but which we also wish to extend to other cities.

We felt invited to examine and adopt strategies that could help our brothers and sisters in need, to nourish their skin at a lower cost, in order to protect melanin substances.

With our research, in a rural area, Idiofa, we have experienced that soap made from plants: Hyssop and Aloe Vera is an answer to this concern.

The manufacture of this soap, offered at low cost, is for us a contribution to the fight against

one of the problems that plague Congolese society in general and that of Idiofa in particular.

Indeed, the research done tells us that hyssop is a sacred purification plant described in Psalm 51. The Bible calls it the herb of forgiveness. Soap made from the hyssop plant purifies and clears the skin of all impurities. Aloe Vera, known for its multiple properties, moisturises, heals and softens the skin. Its gel also relieves skin lesions.



The good use of some natural products allows us to share this experience of soap-making based on hyssop and aloe vera, so that all together, we can act for the protection of our skin based on plants offered to us freely by our environment, in order to reduce the risk of skin cancer to the as much as possible.

Dear brothers and sisters, your contribution to the continuation of this initiative, this mission will be welcome. However, we remain open to your suggestions. All together, let us be aware and act for the promotion of our low cost and easy to manage plant-based skin care products in order to reduce the risk of skin cancer. This is now our battle cry!

A few days before the celebration, we visited the village chief of Ha Mafefoane, notified him about our desire, and invited him and his people to participate in a cleaning campaign in his village. The chief was pleased with the idea and promised to inform his villagers. On the actual day, however, the turnout was poor due to a funeral service that was held in the village on the same day.

As part of preparation for the campaign, we visited St. Joseph hospital to seek advice and assistance on how we could safely dispose of the waste we were to collect. The hospital not only agreed to help us safely dispose of our collected waste but also donated refuse bags to use during the campaign. We also invited the students of St. Mary's High School to participate in the campaign as a way of

teaching them to know that the survival of our planet depends on the contribution of each one of us.

Before the commencement of our journey, one of the Sisters briefly explained to the people present the purpose of the day and the importance of caring for and keeping our Common Home clean, because we are related to and interconnected with Mother Earth

and all she has. The students were delighted to take part in the campaign.

We started cleaning from the area outside St. Mary's High School and made our way to Ha Mafefoane until we reached St. Joseph Hospital, our disposal area. People who passed by were very content and amazed at what we did.

From time to time, they gave words or signs of gratitude for the work well done. Arriving at the hospital, we found the security guards already waiting for us at the gate; they directed us to the place where we took our collected waste. The campaign helped us realize that it is in our hands to see to it that we create and make the world a better place. Every little effort we put into caring for our common home makes a difference.


THE JOY OF MY PROFESSION...



started giving therapeutic massage at a very young age at the leprosarium in 1989, under the encouragement of Srs. Consuelo and Marie Paula, Sisters of the Holy Family of Bordeaux. They encouraged me to give myself to the leprosarium, in order to support my parents and my family. My parents were lepers, so this galvanised me to give more of myself to help and understand people with disabilities. I was lucky enough to participate and be trained by the group from the University of France who came to Africa to train people in this profession. It was much later that I opened my own centre, supported by the Sisters of the Holy Family, and by Don Justo De La Valee. It is a very noble profession, I do it with determination, to fight against disability. It is my passion, because for me, to re-

ceive a disabled person who cannot walk, and who after a time of care, massage and accompaniment manages to stand on his two feet and to take steps is a real miracle. Sometimes it is not easy, because this is a very sensitive, aggressive and demanding category; however, it requires us to receive them with a lot of gentleness, patience and calm in order to better accompany them and help them overcome their illness. It is in this that I find my joy, which is fortified in Christ, who gives me the strength to continually set my objectives on results and not on salary. Yes, lifting people up is what we humbly seek in our profession.

I know that it is not easy for parents with disabled children, especially in Africa where the evolution of this science is not yet known in its entirety, because in some families where we still find cases of a disabled child (Cerebral palsy, club foot...), the parents take him to river to drown him, saying that it is a sacrifice to the God of water ... but times have now changed. There is a need for a great deal of awareness-raising to be done at this



level, because people living with a disability also have their dignity. And it is our duty to accompany them from birth to old age.

My deepest wish is that the Lord will grant me and my team, and all the people who work in the background, the necessary strength to continue to accomplish this mission that he has entrusted to us.

SYNODALITY IN THE LIFE AND MISSION OF THE CHURCH

HOLY FAMILY SISTERS' PARTICIPATION IN INDIA

Unit India

The rapid growth in science and technology affects people's thinking, morality and especially their spirituality. There is a need to change the strategies of evangelisation according to the needs of the time. The Synod is one of those strategies. In 2015 Pope Francis spoke of a Synodal Church as a church which listens, more than simply hearing, it's a mutual listening in which everyone has something to learn. Walk-

ing together may bring more connectedness with the people of God.

We understand that synodality means a way, a path or a specific and particular style or method of being church as the people of God. It's a call for all of us to journey together, listen together, communicate together and do our mission together as one family of God's people in the Church.

The Synod on Synodality has

been a blessing for the Church in India as it has been the largest national exercise – the first of its kind. 129 out of 132 Latin Catholic dioceses across rural, urban and even remote areas of the country participated. The inaugural Eucharistic Celebrations in the dioceses were held in a solemn and elaborate way with some dioceses including leaders of other faiths and traditions. Preparation for the consultations included translation



creation, with nature. The climatic changes affect life on the earth in numerous ways. These changes are having various impacts on the ecosystem and ecology as the world is now warming faster than at any point in recorded history. As a response to this situation we as a community planted trees for any celebrations or any gatherings in the church and in the community. Though our area is known as perennially drought-prone, and dependent on the monsoon, we took as a challenge to take care of them and given awareness to the children, youth and people around us. Now we are happy to see the youth who always provide saplings to the people to plant them in their surroundings. This will bring bright future and bring changes in our district of Sivagangai.

Secondly it is a renewal for us to re-examine our relationship among us, in our communities and in our local church. After hearing of this synodality the church has taken the effort to invite the people from the laity, consecrated religious and secular members and explained the meaning of communion, participation and mission in the church. Time was given to the entire group to share their views and opinions about our participation and our role in the church. We were amazed to see the open

of the documents into 49 local languages. The synod logo and banner were displayed prominently across parishes and institutions and the synod prayer was recited in families and parishes.

Initial skepticism and resistance gave the synodal process a slow start in some dioceses. Paucity of time and the ongoing pandemic situation limited the training of coordinators and outreach to remote areas. While efforts were di-

rected at the more readily available faithful, many of those distanced from the Church could not be included. The organization and facilitation of consultations were led by clergy / religious in many dioceses where lay involvement has not yet come to the fore.

First and foremost this synodality invites us to have right relationship with the cosmic family. We try to re-examine our relationship with the entire

sharing of each one where we experienced the generative listening and creative participation that gives us hope to revitalize our church as people of God. We are aware that to promote more consensus-based decision-making in our communities, in our mission areas we are challenged to move from “command control” model to consensus model.

Thirdly we were inspired to develop more and more transparency in our decision-making, in financial management and in our mission field. It is a reminder for us to live our charism of communion in and around the community and to take steps for transformative action towards our life and mission. This synodality moved us to come out from the attitude of individualism

to communion.

Today in our world, there is increased awareness of freedom, autonomy, dignity, human rights etc. As St. Paul says, the church is a body in which all members are bound in a relationship of interdependency and equal dignity, but of course with different gifts and charisms. This journey together will call on us to renew our mentalities and our ecclesial structures in order to live out God’s call for the Church amid the present signs of the times. Listening to the entire people of God leads us to respect human dignity and give preference for the voiceless and the abandoned.

Our Founder Pierre Bienvenu cultivated the call to renew the Church of his time, to present to the world a God who was near and a Church with a

‘family face’, something for which the first Christian communities have left us a taste. Inspired by God he conceived the plan of a vast Society, something very new for his time. It would welcome within its fold women and men of all conditions and vocations.

All of us are called to live one vocation and that is the vocation to holiness - the baptized Eucharistic Christians. So the synodality discourse is going to change the way all of us participate in building of the church and that is the dream and vision of our founder’s desire - ***“Have but one heart, one mind, one will – to make Our Lord loved and to win all hearts to him. Then, this good Master will dwell in your midst, and the Holy Family Association, faithful to its mission, will continue to do good upon the earth.”***



CALL TO REVEAL GOD’S MERCIFUL LOVE

Gojra Community

Pakistan

Nature is the sign of God’s presence. In Pakistan, we have many beautiful tourist places. In fact, the country is blessed with beauty and natural resources. We cherish it in abundance, and whenever we need relaxation, peace, stillness, and the desire to spend some time with ourselves, we all turn to somewhere like a park, riverbank, beach, woods, zoo, and so on. Everything is excellent when it’s in balance.

The world knows how the people of Pakistan have suffered the past few months due to floods and heavy rain in most parts of the country. 70% of the country was under water.



All four provinces—Sindh, Baluchistan, KPK, and Punjab—were affected very severely. People have lost their loved ones; animals and houses are wiped away; it is as though they

never existed. Crops were ready to be harvested when the land became infertile. The furious water took all the roads with it. People didn't have time to reach safety. Old people who were not able to walk were carried on the shoulders of their sons or on animals. People on the road were washed away into the drains with their vehicles; those on the streets were carried away by the heavy flow of water; children didn't have time to return from school, neither could parents go to take them to safe places. It was actually a pitiful and unbearable situation.

Seeing the needs of the people, our Sisters from Gojra Community collaborated with the parish priest, planned, shared with the Holy Family Sisters, collected many eatable and usable articles (clothes to wear stitched and unstitched, kitchen things, quilts, etc.) from generous people, and on 8 September went to be one with the victims. They travelled around eight hours and reached the interior of Dera Ghazi Khan, a place unknown to them. They could not communicate much because of the language barrier, but somehow our sisters, priests, and catechists managed to get to know the people through the signs. As soon as people saw the vehicle, hoping to get some aid, they all rushed towards them. They started fighting among themselves and with our group because they wanted things only for themselves. According to their words, three weeks had passed, but up to that time no help had reached them. Our group helped more than fifty families with food and other items. They were very grateful to receive the help.

The group said it was a great consolation and a source of peace to see smiles on their faces. At the same time, it was very painful to see the small children, old and sick people, and the pathetic situation of the pregnant women who were without any medical facilities.

It was a great support to have our Sr. Nasreen (on home-leave from the Unit of Britain and Ireland) with the group for the distribution.

Our other communities from 6/4L and Quetta also went to be with the victims, directly and indirectly, with different groups that had been formed. Our sisters also offered financial help to the needy through Caritas.

As a result of poverty, desperation, and frustration, people from one province are roaming all over the country in groups; first they began to kidnap children, and now no one is safe. After kidnapping, they remove the body organs, sell them and throw the body away. People are very alert and wary of strangers, keep their doors shut and avoid travelling late in the evening, especially from lonely places or roads. In some places, villagers have taken precautions and stopped baggers and hawkers from entering their villages.

Now, not only are the flood victims suffering due to a lack of basic things—sickness, insecurity—but the whole country is in fear and anxiety. Nobody knows what will happen next to them or their loved ones.

We all trust in God that one day the situation of the country will be better and people will live in peace, love and harmony.



WE WALK BY FAITH, NOT BY SIGHT



“Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe” (Jn 28 :29). This was the answer of the Risen Lord to Thomas, the apostle, when he made his profession of faith saying “My Lord and my God” after doubting. Jesus gives a gentle rebuke to Thomas for his insistence to “see” before he could “believe”. However, it is not so much a rebuke to Thomas as an encouragement to those who would come later.

The definition of faith, according to the Letter to the Hebrews is “Faith is the assurance of the things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen” (Hebrews 11:1). If we can perceive with our human mind and intellect what our future will be, then, we do not need faith. We long to see the light only when we walk in the dark. As Saint Cardinal Newman puts it “Lead kindly light amidst the encircling gloom”, the believer does not demand to see the entire route map of his journey with

God, but is satisfied saying “One step is enough for me”. The obedience of faith impels us move from one phase of our life to another, with absolute trust in God.

It is precisely this trust in God that made the whole people of God to obey as they took part in the Salvation history. In their trials and difficulties, they were able to believe in the promises of God. Their life was a real pilgrimage of faith. Mary, our Blessed Mother is a beautiful example of faith to us, her children. Throughout her life, she walked by faith and not by sight, according to the words of St. Paul in his second Letter to the Corinthians.

you.” God has been repeating these words, assuring us of his presence with us always. *“Even though I walk through the dark valley, I fear no evil, for you are with me”* was the experience of the Psalmist (Ps. 23:4). The presence of God is what makes us walk in faith.

As we, members of the Holy Family of Bordeaux remember and celebrate with gratitude the bicentenary of the miraculous Eucharistic benediction. It calls us to renew our faith in the presence of God. God continues to tell us *“I AM WHO AM”*. Our Founder says “The Divine Master miraculously blessed our Association from its birth and, by manifesting in this way his divine Presence among our Foundresses, it seemed as if he wanted to tell us that he would be with us always (Selected Texts, No. 107). Yes, God is with us always. The Risen Christ said: *“Remember I am with you always to the end of the ages”* (Mt. 28: 20). So believing in the Presence of “the God with us”, the Risen Christ, we make the profession of faith with the apostle Thomas: *“My Lord and my God”*.

Very often we met on the roads as we carried our placards. The situation led us to meet again and discuss our feelings. There we wanted to see our presence in this criti-

cal situation through the eyes of our Good Father. We came up with the idea of sharing the Good Father's thoughts relevant to our context through our WhatsApp groups. As we do this activity, we see how our spirituality helps us and guides us to go forward finding our meaning as Religious in this prevailing situation.

As we proceeded, another new idea came up in the group: to go beyond our sharing life experiences to listen to people outside who are working with people and trying to live kingdom values. It was a great opportunity and we are looking forward to continue it.

Our next plan is to celebrate our Good Father's birthday. We are hoping to do a one-day programme for the Holy Family Youth of our local cells in order to exchange our talents and resources and finally to taste the art of team work.

- ☞ Conducting meditation sessions with victims at courts.
- ☞ Conducting awareness programs in schools in collaboration with other religious representatives.

As the Holy Father in invites us to go to the peripheries and to serve according to the needs of the time, under the guidance and leadership of our Provincial we are able to respond to this new mission positively. Let us promote our Charism “Communion” amidst the society to bring salvation to all in Jesus Christ.



RESPONDING TO THE CALLS IN OUR CONTEXT: THE PBN FAMILY IN ACTION...

PBN Family - Philippines

We, the Apostolic Sisters and Lay Associates of the Philippines move forward together in our journey of life and ministries, hand in hand we work together and walk together to bring the Good News to everyone. Even during Pandemic we served as frontliners being the “Prayer Warriors” who led the people in our communities to confide all our worries and fears to God. Until now we continue to pray and keep ourselves as Prayer Warriors, re-connecting the people who forgot how to pray because of their busy life. This helps us maintain our own prayer life as Consecrated and committed members of the Holy Family. We also invite the people to join us in our Gospel sharing, hour of Prayer and Adoration and introduce to them the PBN Family.

We are on Mission and are engaged in Pastoral and humanitarian ministries. We are leading the Program of Pastoral Care for Children, (PCC) - a program in which we take care of Families from the most vulnerable communities who belong to the poorest of the poor. This is the biggest program that we have as a Family, in place for more than

5 years now. It has given us the opportunity to reach out to those in the peripheries. The Program is one of Brazilian origin, introduced to us by the Congregation of the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary of Carters. is a Holistic Pro-



gram to take care of the spiritual, physical and humanitarian needs of the whole family. On a Monthly basis, we are assigned to take care of 5 to 10 families - to weigh the children, monitor the pregnant women, monitor the health and nutrition status of the family specially the undernourished children. We also come together once a month to evaluate, to submit reports of the home visitation, discuss problems and other matters that concerns the PCC Families. We gather the PCC Families monthly for their Parents' On-going Formation, where we share the Word of God to strengthen them in their Faith, and conduct Catechism Classes for Children. Topics on

Evangelization, Education, Health and Nutrition, Values Education, Responsibilities as citizens towards Environment are given priority in the On-going Formation.

Home Visitation has been a great opportunity for us to be with the people to know them and their situations. Their simplicity touches us and we learn from them how to be patient, accommodative and smiling in spite of difficulties and family problems in their daily living.

We help in organizing the livelihood seminars in order for us to select members for the planned Livelihood Programs through the help of PBN Foundation and other sources. We were successful in initiating, training and assisting the beneficiaries with the needed funds and materials for programs such as Cosmetic Services, Food Stalls, Buy and Sell Products. The students from poor families in our neighborhood too were helped to complete their Education which was very much appreciated.

We organized several “Community Pantry” to help the people without means of livelihood during the Pandemic with groceries and milk supplements for the children. We



are grateful to all those who supported us with donations of goods. We also conduct Feeding Programs for the identified undernourished children in our communities where PCC is actively present, providing food-supplement made of corn-flour, rice-flour, milk powder, sugar, moringa-powder, monggo-flour and distributing it to the families with under-nourished children. We are grateful to the Diocesan Social Action Center headed by our Priest Associate Fr. George Fajardo for providing us with Vitamins received from Caritas to be distributed to the undernourished children in the indigent families. We, the Lay Associates are taking the responsibility to conduct the weekly program of Feeding – cooking nutritious food – 6 days a week to serve the under-nourished in Seven Areas in Bulan. In all these activities we are together experiencing Synodality and partnership in the mission and are mindful of our Option for the Poor, giving priority through our meaningful involvement and whole-hearted service. We are thank-

ful to God for the people and opportunities He sends us for the realization of “Being and Building Family” through all these programs.

We attend, participate and collaborate with the Local Government Office, Schools and Village Councils, in their initiatives for a “Cleaner and Greener” Community Awareness Programs.

The path of our journey of Life towards our mission is a challenge to remain faithful to our commitment and to strengthen our sense of belonging to the Family. Our “walking together” in all our differences and diversities, in times of joys and sorrows, difficulties and pains, in dark and light moments, in doubts and anxieties gives us strength beyond words to sustain us in living our Baptismal Consecration and our Vocation in the Holy Family to the full, and to show the Family Face of the Church, as the domestic church called to witness to Communion. Jesus Mary and Joseph are our Models, our light and our way to live a simple, joyful, witnessing life, leading us on the path to re-



main ever faithful to our Vocation as Members of the Holy Family. The hardships that we encounter in our journey never stop us carrying out our mission.
